

The Ramadan Dua Ecosystem: A Neuro-Spiritual Guide & Pocket Planner (2026)

2. The 2026 Ramadan Pocket Planner: Essential Duas

Below are the authentic supplications optimized for mobile reading. Each entry includes Arabic, Transliteration, English (Saheeh International), and Urdu (Fateh Muhammad Jalandhari).

A. Suhoor: The Intention (Niyah)

Note: The intention is primarily an action of the heart. The verbal recitation is a helpful focus tool.

- Arabic: **وَبِصَوْمِ غَدٍ نُّؤَيِّتُ مِنْ شَهْرِ رَمَضَانَ**
- Transliteration: *Wa bisawmi ghadin nawaytu min shahri Ramadan*
- English: "I intend to keep the fast for tomorrow in the month of Ramadan."
- Urdu: "Aur main ne mah-e-Ramadan ke kal ke roze ki niyat ki."

B. Iftar: The Authentic Sunnah for Breaking Fast

Best for: Immediately after drinking water or eating a date to express gratitude.

- Arabic: **ذَهَبَ الظَّمَأُ وَأَبْتَلَّتِ العُرُوقُ وَثَبَتَ الأَجْرُ إِن شَاءَ اللهُ**
- Transliteration: *Thahaba al-zama'u wabtallat al-'uruqu wa thabata al-ajru inshaAllah*
- English: "The thirst is gone, the veins are moistened, and the reward is certain, if Allah wills."
- Urdu: "Pyaas bujh gayi, ragein tar ho gayin aur sawab sabit ho gaya, agar Allah ne chaha."

C. The "Hidden Gem": The Dua of Distress (Yunus AS)

Best for: Moments of intense hunger (The "Sugar Crash") or weakness. The Prophet ﷺ said no Muslim recites this for any matter except that Allah responds.

- Arabic: **لَا إِلَهَ إِلا أَنْتَ سُبْحَانَكَ إِنِّي كُنْتُ مِنَ الظَّالِمِينَ**
- Transliteration: *La ilaha illa anta subhanaka inni kuntu minaz-zalimin*
- English: "There is no deity except You; exalted are You. Indeed, I have been of the wrongdoers."
- Urdu: "Tere siwa koi mabood nahi, Tu paak hai, beshak main hi qusoor waroon mein se hoon."

D. Laylatul Qadr: The "System Reset" Dua

Best for: The last ten nights of Ramadan. This Dua asks for 'Afuww—a complete erasure of the sin from your record, as if it never happened.

- Arabic: **اللَّهُمَّ إِنَّكَ عَفُوفٌ تُحِبُّ العَفْوَ فَاعْفُ عَنِّي**
- Transliteration: *Allahumma innaka 'afuwwun tuhibbul 'afwa fa'fu 'anni*
- English: "O Allah, You are Pardoning and You love to pardon, so pardon me."
- Urdu: "Aye Allah! Beshak Tu maaf karne wala hai, maaf karne ko pasand karta hai, pas mujhe maaf farma de."

E. The Comprehensive Dua (Rabbana Atina)

Best for: Any time of day to cover all bases.

- Arabic: **رَبَّنَا آتِنَا فِي الدُّنْيَا حَسَنَةً وَفِي الآخِرَةِ حَسَنَةً وَقِنَا عَذَابَ النَّارِ**
- Transliteration: *Rabbana atina fid-dunya hasanatan wa fil 'akhirati hasanatan waqina 'adhaban-nar*
- English: "Our Lord, give us in this world [that which is] good and in the Hereafter [that which is] good and protect us from the punishment of the Fire."
- Urdu: "Aye hamare Rab! Hamein duniya mein bhi bhalayi de aur akhirat mein bhi bhalayi de aur hamein aag ke azab se bacha."

3. People Also Ask

Common questions answered

- **"What is the best time for Dua in Ramadan?"** The two most potent times are the time of *Suhoor* (the last third of the night) and the moments immediately preceding *Iftar* (sunset), when the fasting person is in a state of humble submission.
- **"Is the Ashra Dua authentic?"** The specific hadiths dividing Ramadan into three 10-day stages with specific Duas are considered weak (*Da'eef*) by many scholars. However, the concepts of Mercy, Forgiveness, and Emancipation are valid, and you may pray for them in your own words throughout the month.
- **"Can I read Dua in English or Urdu during Sujood?"** Yes. While the obligatory parts of Salah must be in Arabic, the majority of scholars allow making personal Dua in your own language during *Sujood* (prostration), especially for voluntary (Nafl) prayers.
